## **Pegmatites**

Lizzie Triano discovered this web page about pegmatites and thought it might be of special interest to DMS members.

Pegmatites of course are those areas or zones within a granitic rock formation where a portion of the hot molten rock has cooled very slowly and allowed enough time for large crystals to form and develop. This is the "sweet spot", so to speak where, the beautifully formed collectible minerals like quartz feldspar and mica come from

The www site referenced by Lizzie is a page from the larger website of the American Mineralogical Society. The AMS is a professional scientific organization which publishes several monthly Journals, including The American *Mineralogist* and *Elements*. The articles in *The* American Mineralogist are very specialized and very technical, bearing on the research done by the best scientists in the world talking to other scientists. The Journal Elements is written with a wider audience in mind, and the focus seems to be to cover the subject of minerals more for the general public. Both Journals require a subscription to access full on line articles from the publications. Abstracts for all issues for both publications are available on line and complete articles from The

American Mineralogist published before 2000 are available for free on line.

There are a few parts of the website that are intended for the amateur rock collector including an intriguing crystal database. Here is the Link to the main AMS website here you will find links to all of their publications including "Mineralogy for Kids" and "Collectors Corner"

A good primer on the general subject of pegmatites that is not too technical can be found on the internet at a site called Wickipedia,

For folks just getting started with minerals the technical terminology can be a great barrier to understanding even the basic concepts of the more scientificside to those wonderful crystals that got us interested in this subject in the first place. There is little to do but to slowly and constantly educate yourself. But carry on, you can do that at your own pace and there are no exams or quizzes.

A website such as Wickipedia is designed to help interested nonexperts in any field learn as much as you want. Most of the technical terms you will see in the Wiki are "linked" to another page that will provide a description or definition of the term you want more information about. In addition you can simply keep a browser window open to you favorite search program such as google and look for more information throughout the entire world wide web, the www.

I started my search for a definition of Pegmatite by simply typing that word into the google search window and was instantly presented with 491.000 places to look for information about pegmatite. I usually don't need to look at references beyond the first page of the search results.

Oh, and please, be patient, and enjoy. Mineralogy is an enormously large field to study and it branches out to almost everywhere; from planetary science and cosmology to jewelry and the healing power of crystals. The lucky people eventually find a specialty to concentrate on, but others of us are doomed to being generalists and skipping from one subject to another endlessly.

Visitors and guests are welcome at all meetings. The January meeting is usually a dinner seminar. There are no meetings in July. August is preparation time for the annual mineral and jewelry show in September. Junior Club members meet at 7:00 pm before the regular meeting. Our last dues increase was in 2002 to cover the increasing cost of the bulletin and liability and accident insurance to cover the members on field trips and other club activities. The current membership dues are \$12.50 per adult individual / \$17.50 per family (including children under 18) \$ 7.50 for students and senior citizens. Only dues paying members are covered by our liability and accident insurance and receive the print version of the Danburite.

The particular objectives for which this Society is formed are:

- To promote general interest in mineralogy
- To study rocks, minerals, fossils and the lapidary arts through lectures and discussion groups and field trips.
- To encourage the search for minerals indigenous to our areas
- To keep an accurate and permanent record of all mineral localities visited by this society and to make such records available to all members.
