

August 25 field trip to Old Mine Park, Trumbull, Conn.

We will park at the upper entrance at the southern end of Corporate Drive (see map at end of bulletin) after 9 AM.

This location is a shorter and easier walk to the upper mine pit and relatively newly found topaz vein, where most digging will be, than from the lower parking lot.

There are many minerals found here over the last 200 years, but most likely to be found are topaz and fluorite in the various cross-cutting veins (see map at end of bulletin), and scheelite and ferberite (aka wolframite) pseudomorphs after scheelite in dumps at the upper pit. Review the photos and details (hint: set the blue "Display" button at upper left on "Detailed") on minerals found at the mindat.org page:




DMS Hastings Claim

It's important to FOLLOW THE RULES so here they are:

- 1. NO ONE IS ALLOWED ON THE HILL AFTER SUNSET! (NO EXCEPTIONS)
- 2. There is to be no glass on the hill.
- 3. Children are welcome to come and dig with you. They are your children and your responsibility. Keep them with you, and under control, and out of other people's claims! Children under the age of 16 must be with an adult.
- 4. Pets are welcome, but need to be kept on a leash of not more than 8 feet. You are responsible for cleaning up your pet's waste. Due to safety concerns, there will be no exceptions to this rule.
- 5. The trees are our friends!! There is to be no cutting of trees, or painting on the trees. Linda will decide what gets cut and what does not get cut. Talk to her first.
- 6. Everyone must do their part to keep DIAMOND ACRES clean. We have a carry-it-in then carry-it-out policyy. If you carry it in full you should be able to carry it out empty.
- 7. After all this time claim jumping still seems to be an issue. If you are caught in another person's claim without permission, you'll be asked to leave. FOREVER. Also do not walk thru other people's claims to get to your claim. This is an example of claim jumping. We are this serious about this matter. When in doubt ask. Who will be the first one booted and put on our new wall of shame?
- 8. The fee to dig is \$2.00 a day per person. The dig fee is \$1.00 a day 13 years and younger. There is no "I just want to go look." Try going to an amusement park and tell them you want to get in to "just look."

- 9. IF YOU GET STUCK IN THE PARKING AREA AND MAKE RUTS, YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR FILLING IN THE RUTS. Early spring and late fall digging is at Linda's discretion. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 10. THERE WILL BE ABSOLUTELY NO MOVING OF BOUNDARY ROPES WITHOUT LINDA'S KNOWLEDGE AND APPROVAL. NO EXCEPTIONS.
- 11. The claims are issued by Linda. Claim fees only cover your claim, and not your digging fees; they must be paid when you come to dig, whether you have a claim or not. Any claim not worked at least once in a 14-day period will result in a forfeiture of the claim. [note: don't panic, this seems to be enforced only if it seems necessary.] If claim fees are not kept up to date, you will lose your claim. If this happens, you may put your name on the waiting list for a new claim. There are people waiting for a claim, so if you lose yours for any reason, you might not get the same spot back. Claim holders should come in as early as possible in the spring to get their ropes up and pits in order. This will help to keep others out, by giving the appearance that it is a working claim. Remember the best way to keep unwanted people out of your claim is for you to be in it. Please if you have any questions, or need clarification of the rules please ask. This way there can be no misunderstanding.
- 12. From October 1 through May 1 digging is restricted to claim holders only. Have a lot of fun and good hunting.

Brad Smith's BenchTips

FOREDOM MAINTENANCE

If you have a Foredom flexshaft, it makes sense to check it over every so often to be sure it's running properly. But how to do that? You've probably lost the little booklet that came with the unit. Well, being the good company it is, Foredom has put together an extensive set of videos on how to do it.

The series covers set-up, lubrication, replacing a sheath, motor maintenance, and handpiece maintenance. Few if any special tools are needed. You can watch the videos at www.foredom.net/videolibrary.aspx and repair parts are available from most jewelry supply catalogs.

JUST A DROP

Hobby shops and model airplane stores carry small plastic dispenser bottles that are handy bench items for putting a drop of oil or glue just where you want it.



The small metal tubing lets you squeeze out very small drops and reach into tight places.

I use the small one on the left for oil when I'm sawing or drilling harder metals like steel. And I use the bottle on the right from a plastics store for the fast drying glues used to join pieces of acrylic.

Gem of a break-in

Johannesburg - Hundreds of thousands of rand worth of gemstones and a sample of fool's gold have been stolen from MuseuMAfricA - the second theft to hit the museum in just two months.

The theft was discovered last Wednesday, but museum management and the City of Joburg have remained tight-lipped.

The haul of about 40 stones includes samples of amethyst, quartz and about 25 pieces of rough, uncut tourmaline.

The thieves also made off with two rhodochrosites - deep-red mineral specimens from the Kalahari Desert.

A few extras taken from other displays included an old diamond-head drill bit, a piece

of rock from the Merensky platinum reef and a sample of fool's gold.

"The announcement of this theft had not been made public due to preliminary investigations being undertaken," said council spokesman Nthatisi Modingoane.

Originally belonging to the Chamber of Mines and the Geological Society of South Africa (GSSA), the collection was donated to the city in 1927.

Modingoane said the GSSA and the Geology Museum Association (GMA) had been alerted, and pictures of the stolen items were sent to mineral collectors and dealers.

The council would not provide a value for the stash, but GMA chairman Professor Bruce Cairncross estimated it to be worth hundreds of thousands of rand.

"This was a highly collectable and valuable selection," he said. "Whoever took them knew exactly what they were going for."

The pair of rhodochrosites alone were probably worth about \$20 000 (R200 000), while one of the larger tourmaline crystals could fetch \$5 000 on its own, he said.

It's the second theft this year. In May, about 30 gems - including opals, zircon and rubies - vanished.

The remainder of the gemstone exhibit has now been removed to a place of safety, with only the fake glass diamonds left on display. A case was opened with the police.

The council also said "additional securing and locking mechanisms" had been installed.

Questions still linger about how the specimens were stolen, as the glass of the gemstone display wasn't broken. The only other access to the stones is around the back of the display cabinet - accessed only by a concealed and locked door.

It's also unclear exactly when the stones went missing, and whether they were taken in a single heist or siphoned off over time. A security guard is stationed next to the display from 9am to 5pm, but there are no surveillance cameras.

It's not the first time the geology exhibit has been targeted. Over a two-month period in 2000, two men made off with about 170 of some of the museum's best mineral specimens. The thieves forced open the locks on the old cases, rearranging the remaining specimens to fill up any gaps in the display.

The whole display has since been overhauled, and the council said funds had been set aside for the museum to be upgraded again this year, a move that would include improved security measures.

But for the GMA, the security of the collection remains a concern.

"In general, geology museums in South Africa aren't being well managed," said Cairncross.
"This collection has been in existence since the 1880s. It's a national asset."

adipocere (ad'-i-po-cere") A waxy or unctuous, brownish or light-colored natural substance consisting mainly of free fatty acids, hydroxy acids, and their calcium and magnesium salts, formed on decay of human, animal, or fish remains in damp areas or in fresh or salt water. Its consistency may range from soft and pliable for recent material to hard and brittle for older material. It often replaces and takes the form of the decomposing body.

base [petroleum] An informal term for the hydrocarbon series that is dominant in a given crude oil. Cf: asphalt-base crude; mixed-base crude; paraffin-base crude.

sulfuric-acid aerosols Small droplets of sulfuric acid formed in the atmosphere from oxidation of sulfur-rich gases. These aerosols can form a haze in the upper atmosphere after volcanic eruptions, which can reduce incoming sunlight and cool the planet (Rampino and Self, 2000).







Veins of quartz +/muscovite, topaz,
fluorite, marialite, albite,
chlorite, sulfides

Prospecting in many places may yield minerals, but the Topaz Vein (2) is well picked over. Better results can be had at a new topaz vein in the NE corner of the park (5) and in extensive, largely unworked dumps near the Upper Pit (3). Here are scheelite (white) and ferberite (black) pseudomorphs after scheelite. They are typically in very rusty-stained quartz/clinozoisite rock and hard to see - get a feel for the greater weight of pieces with these crystals, then save for later trimming and cleaning.
